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Dear friends, January 2023

Occasionally a magazine will highlight special places in a city that are hidden or little known. One such place in Toronto is the convent and guest house of the Sisterhood of St. John the Divine! It is tucked into property adjacent to St. Johns' Rehabilitation Hospital, hidden from view from the street, in the heart of a residential neighbourhood – an oasis for those who are spiritually hungry or in need of rest and prayer. In quiet faithfulness the convent and guest house offer a refuge for the weary, congregational retreats, and gatherings of Christians and others needing to reflect in a space that nurtures heart, mind and spirit – a "Home for the Heart."

Many clergy recall times at the convent in their discernment for ordained ministry through an ACPO weekend – or their ordination retreat or a few days of blissful quiet to pray. Lay women discerning their vocation have found affirmation and renewal as Companions or through the Crossroads engagement. I am deeply grateful for a community of prayer and a quiet place to call home when, as Primate, I am in Toronto.

The Guest House is a core ministry of SSJD in the midst of Toronto that serves people from across Canada and occasionally hosts international guests. Yet, like our own homes, its building needs to be maintained and periodically renewed to meet the needs of its guests and the standards required. There is an urgent need to replace the roof, the windows, and the heating/cooling system with more environmentally friendly systems, as well as to upgrade and in some cases reconstruct bedrooms, bathrooms, and meeting rooms, including new flooring. One of the most crucial reconstruction projects is a new accessible entrance into the Guest House.

These extraordinary repairs need your support. If you have visited the guest house you know the importance of its ministry. If you have not – please know that many, many guests have been served and the ministry of a quiet space for reflection amidst a community of prayer as a guest is a gift to the world.

I invite you to participate in furthering the Sisters' mission of hospitality. Please read the accompanying information and consider whether you can join in supporting the needs outlined. Donate personally. Invite your parish to consider a gift. Encourage friends and colleagues to donate.

The Convent and the Guest House are a unique gift to the church and the world, especially in a time when we need places of refuge, rest and renewal in order to face the uncertainties of our times. Please help sustain a 'Home for the Heart' at the Convent.



THE GUEST HOUSE

There are more than enough luxury hotels and spas, enough things to do and places to go, in our mobile, consumer-oriented Western world. Our life journey can become cluttered and chaotic, and those places don't quite hit the mark in terms of spiritual respite. Like Jesus, who sometimes stepped back and slipped away from the crowds and even from his disciples, we are invited to stop, rest, become still, and listen.



The Guest House at St. John's Convent offers a sacred place where people can come and find a place of rest and renewal, and open their hearts to the peace, love, and guidance of God. The Guest House is not an ordinary building but a spiritual home for people of all faiths and none, as well as members of the Anglican Communion from across Canada and beyond. Many have found peace and solace within these walls. It is simply a loving place for personal growth and inner light.

The hospitality offered in the Guest House is powerful in its very simplicity. Reflect – refresh – reconnect are words often mentioned by guests, precisely the gifts that the Sisters offer their guests whether in a day or overnight stay on their own private retreat – or in one of the many group retreats and workshops offered by the Sisters.

The Guest House is also open to family members of patients at St. John Rehab, hospital staff overnight during storms, refugee families, and others who need temporary accommodation. The Sisters also offer meeting/retreat space for groups of all faiths and denominations.

The Sisters host gatherings of people from local Anglican parishes and from many other denominations. They also offer workshops and retreats open to all in the "Food for the Soul" program. For the last several years they have expanded their retreats to hybrid and online formats so that spiritual seekers may attend online as well as in person – offering the Sisters and participants opportunities to meet many new friends in faith from across Canada and beyond.








WELCOME TO A HOME FOR...















OUR NEED

We have a life to share, and we look forward to continuing this ministry of hospitality and retreats for many years and future generations. But a Home for the Heart also requires a well-maintained and comfortable but simple physical building. The Guest House was constructed in 1956 and only partially updated in 2004 when the new Convent was built.

While the building has received loving care over the years, it also needs renewing. The Sisters had considered replacing the Guest House with a brand-new building, but desiring to minimize costs and to conserve the sound, well-built building envelope, they decided instead on renovation. In order to ensure it remains a place of hospitality for many years, the Sisters of St. John the Divine request your help for the renewal of this comfortable, homey building:

Replacing the roof, using energy-efficient, sustainable materials.	\$150,000
Replacing the old boiler and inefficient radiators with an ecologically balanced heating and cooling system. Includes replacing old ductwork and rooftop HVAC systems.	\$750,000
Redesigning the awkward entrance to the Guest House with a fully accessible entry way, including a pergola to mirror the Convent's main front entrance.	\$100,000
Replacing the double-hung windows with casement windows for easier use, better ventilation, better insulation in both cold and hot weather, and better security on the main floor.	\$175,000
Redesigning the shared washrooms and shower rooms with fully contained 3-piece bathrooms.	\$1,710,000
Upgrading accessible bedrooms and bathrooms and creating an additional new accessible bedroom/bathroom.	\$300,000
Replacing the current space-guzzling bedroom closets and large dressers with smaller and simpler furniture to maximize the simplicity and spaciousness of guest bedrooms.	\$150,000
Reconfiguring some other rooms to provide for more efficient use of space throughout the Guest House. Includes new flooring.	\$135,000
Replace 20-year-old carpeting in the halls with more modern, easier to clean and hypoallergenic flooring.	\$30,000


A RENEWED GUEST HOUSE: FLOOR ONE

THE SISTERHOOD OF ST. JOHN THE DIVINE

The Sisterhood of St. John the Divine sprang to life in September 1884, when a Canadian widow, Hannah Grier Coome, made her vows to the Bishop of Toronto, along with two other novices. This vibrant religious community over its long history has ministered across Canada in British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Ontario, Quebec, and Nova Scotia.

In 1885, just a year after our founding, the first five Sisters had opened a hospital, a home for the aged, and a mission house, all in support of urban Toronto's most vulnerable people. These expressions of hospitality expanded over the next 138 years to include schools, an orphanage, two homes for those with intellectual disabilities, and always opportunities for quests and groups to come to the Guest House for retreat and guiet.

Our life and work continue to draw the engaged interest of many people of all ages, genders, races, ethnicities, and religions across Canada and beyond. We have been blessed with new members, retreatants, and affiliates on a regular basis, and see our mission and vision renewed as we engage fully, connecting in new ways.

Today, we continue to reach out in teaching, healing, caring, and loving the people God brings to us. We provide active hospitality, retreats, spiritual direction, and outreach into the community. We also continue to provide spiritual care to patients, staff, and students at St John's Rehab, founded by the Sisterhood in 1936 and now part of Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre.

Prior to the global pandemic we welcomed over 2,500 guests annually, and we are now delighted to have our Guest House open again.

Future development of our ministry depends on a vibrant community of Sisters committed to serving those to whom God calls us. We are enthusiastic about the development of our community even with the challenges faced by the church itself in terms of declining membership. Life in a religious order is a welcome alternative to women seeking a life of prayer and service in the midst of a self-focused and materialistic culture.





Our anticipation of the continued health of the community has been strengthened by the response of the many women who attend our July program called Women at a Crossroads, and by those who participate each year in our Companions program – some in person, some online.

The Sisters also actively seek to serve the Church by preaching and teaching in the parishes, serving on diocesan or national committees, teaching and studying at Toronto School of Theology, and in many other ways connecting with those who are seeking a more meaningful life. A new staff position, Director of Operations, provides a good deal of support to free sisters up from administrative duties for direct involvement in our ministries.
