Dear Associates, Oblates and Friends,



A fter a lovely fall, winter is just around the corner. Most of the leaves have fallen, including the brilliant yellow "fan-shaped" leaves of the Ginkgo tree in front of the lobby at the convent.

A week ago I was meditating in the Guest House Courtyard, appreciating the colours of the leaves and blossoms that

were dying. It had been a difficult week but I found myself focusing on the word "hope", knowing that new life was hidden under the carpet of leaves and would appear again next spring.

In August we had our Annual General Chapter. We began each day with the Holy Eucharist before starting the business of the day, stopped for the noon office at 12:15 and ended with Evening Prayer so our days were wrapped in prayer. We began by hearing reports by the Reverend Mother, reports on those in formation and reports about each of our ministries: Associates. Oblates. Companions, Guest House, St. John's Rehab and of course the Capital Campaign Committee chaired by Archbishop Fred Hiltz and Sr. Constance Joanna. We are so grateful for the help of each member of that committee. As of November we have raised a little over \$4.3 million. We have agreed that we need \$4.8 before we can begin construction so we hope to raise another \$500,000 by the beginning of February.

We had four major topics at our Chapter. One of them was our chemical footprint. Our goal is to reduce, replace or remove 20% of the hazardous chemicals we use over a period of three years. We heard an excellent presentation from two sisters. Part of our Baptismal Covenant is to safeguard the integrity of God's creation and respect, sustain and renew the life of the earth. We were all encouraged to become "label readers" and learn to recognize

the pictograms on all products containing harmful chemicals or causing health hazards. One of our Oblates on residential time in October was given the task of listing products with hazardous chemicals in our laundry room and housekeeping cupboard. I would encourage each of you to also become aware of products in your homes that contain harmful chemicals or cause health hazards.

Another major topic was Anti-bias/Anti-racism training led by Br. Reg of the Order of the Holy Cross who spent three days with us giving us a workshop each day and showing a video in the evening. He provided us with many handouts, a list of videos that we can watch during the year, and a display of books. Br. Reg is a dynamic speaker and available to do similar training for parishes in the Diocese of Toronto.

Our training was interrupted by the funeral of Archbishop Michael Peers who had been a much-loved friend of the community for many years along with his wife Dorothy. Several of us attended the funeral at St. James' Cathedral and were so glad we could be there.



As always, our Chapter was followed by our Long Retreat. This year we were delighted to have Bp. Mary Irwin-Gibson, bishop of the Diocese of

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Montreal, as our retreat leader. She was so warm and open in sharing from her own personal experience, especially around the theme of healing.

In mid-September Sr. Brenda visited the Diocese of Caledonia where she was the keynote speaker at their synod. She also preached at the

cathedral in Prince Rupert on September 17th.

Meanwhile we were welcoming six of the 2023-2024 Companions to the Convent for an Orientation weekend so that they could get to know one another before going online, experience the life and prayer of the convent, and meet individual sisters. Two of the Companions were unable to be here in person, so they joined us online. Some of

the highlights were the sessions on Art as Prayer, walking the labyrinth and a visit to the Marc Chagall exhibit at Wycliffe College where Svetlana Panich shared some of her knowledge and enthusiasm for the artwork of Marc Chagall. It was a great beginning to the 2023/2024 Companions program.

Later in September we had a different kind of special event, the baptism of Annie Dowling. Her mother Jess had been on the Companions Program of 21/22 so we were delighted when she asked if Annie could be baptised at the convent.

It always seems as if September is the beginning of a new year, perhaps because so much of my life

We have had several groups and many individuals staying in the Guest House and requests for spiritual direction or for a sister to preach or lead retreats. Sr. Constance Joanna returned to Trinity College to teach a course on Anglican Spirituality.

On the negative side, Sr. Brenda went to Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre for what she thought would be minor surgery and discovered she needed a triple by-pass. Her surgery went well and four days later she was sent to St. John's Rehab, next door to the convent, for rehabilitation. Sr. Amy Joy has asked for a year's leave of

Guest House Report

2023 has been a very busy and fulfilling year for the Guest House as we seek to serve Christ in all whom we meet through our Guest House ministry. Although a few COVID-19 cases meant we had to cancel the 2022 Christmas and New Year's Eve retreats, by January 2023 we were back up and running. "Running" is the operative word. We have been busy.

We began the year with several Diocese of Toronto events as well as several other large groups from the wider community. We continue to host many Diocesan events, from both Toronto and Huron dioceses including pre- and post-ordination retreats, Diocese of Toronto Momentum and other Diocese of Toronto events which combine aspects of retreats, meetings and workshops.

In 2023 we have also been able to welcome groups from many other denominations including Baptist, Christian Reformed, United, Presbyterian, Catholic and a variety of community churches.

SSJD also hosted a number of Food for the Soul events this past year including a very popular John Bell retreat called "The Engaged Spirituality of Jesus", a Lenten Quiet Day with Sr. Elizabeth Ann, the Holy Week Retreat with Sr. Anne, a Julian of Norwich retreat led by Sr. Elizabeth and a handful of Quiet Garden Days led by various sisters including Sr. Amy Joy and Sr. Suzanne Marie.

Many guests expressed their joy at being back with the community again after the long gap created by the COVID-19 pandemic. The sisters were also delighted to return to what felt like "near normal".

This July, for the first time since 2019, we were overjoyed to offer our Women at a Crossroads program. We welcomed nine women for a three-week program "that helps women discern where God may be calling them, through engaging in classes

and discussions about Christian life and vocation, receiving personal guidance in deepening their prayer life and sharing the life of a Christian community committed to a balanced life of prayer, service, study, rest, and recreation."

Several years ago we decided as a community to reduce the number and size of groups we accommodate so we can more regularly welcome individuals who are also looking for silence, solitude, rest and refreshment. This decision has worked well, however, our hospitality remains affected by the continuing presence of COVID-19 in the world. We still limit seating in our Refectory which of course affects the number of guests we can welcome at any one time. We still screen guests for COVID-19 when they arrive, and ask guests and sisters to use hand sanitizer in the Refectory and Chapel but masks are now optional for guests, staff and sisters.

We are planning to close the Guest House for renovations as of January 1, 2024. Looking ahead to the end of 2023 we will offer our usual Advent Quiet Day on Saturday, December 2, 2023, as well as our regular Christmas and New Year's Eve retreats. Keep checking our website for more information about these.

Guests often comment admiringly on how well everything seems to work together during their time with us. We receive compliments on the food, the cleanliness, the comfort and the quiet. These remarks make me think of the image of a swan gliding serenely along the surface of the water while paddling furiously beneath the surface. The Guest House is supported by many different people in many different roles. We are grateful for the assistance of staff in Housekeeping, the Kitchen and Refectory, Maintenance, and Administration. We are also grateful for the prayerful and practical support we receive from so many people including many volunteers.

Currently the Guest House Team is Jeanette Strong, Administrative Assistant, Judith Milne, Residential Companion, Susan Murphy at Reception and Sr. Wendy Grace, Guest House Coordinator.

St. John's Rehab Spiritual Care

The current St. John's Rehab spiritual care team is comprised of Sisters Louise, Florence, Kathryn, and Amy Joy and me. We are pleased that Sr. Suzanne Marie has been able to re-join us some Sundays to support the visiting and any needed bed communions for patients. I am happy to say that the COVID-19 outbreaks or any kind of respiratory outbreaks were almost zero through the late spring and summer of this year (2023). We saw more outbreaks in the autumn but we are prepared with good protocols and good understanding of living with the virus and how we will care for the patients. We have worked to clarify who we are and communicate what we do in Spiritual Care.

Sr. Florence created a useful new brochure to share with patients and families and even with staff who want to learn more. The brochure is a single paperback-sized sheet, with text on both sides, but well-spaced and easy to read with great clip art and diagrams. The brochure also brings together a sense of assurance to the Sisterhood and me in this ministry, giving us a common language and foundation to work together to provide care.

There were more encouraging changes in the hospital as of this summer. Volunteers are slowly returning. Our three library volunteers, Gwynneth, In-Ing and Geoff, staff the Bigwood Patient Library during the week. It's not only open for patents to browse in, but the volunteers take the book cart to the units for patients who are not mobile enough to go to the library. Our Angel Cupboard of therapy clothes and toiletries for patients who have none, or not enough, is ably cared for by Jane Winstanley, a long-time volunteer and SSJD associate. In September our healing Eucharist returned to our chapel on Sunday mornings to the joy and gratitude of all.

We had 10 wonderful students in SJR for the Advanced Pastoral Care course this past year, including Sr. Kathryn. Alongside visiting patients on her unit, Sr. Kathryn joined all student groups with me at SJR as well as attending a weekly class. This is vital learning, deepening her excellent natural skills in pastoral care.

One of the students, Patricia Rocco, needed a placement to fulfil the field work required for her Master of Divinity. I was pleased to invite her to remain with us till September to complete the requirements with me as her supervisor. Patricia was

a true blessing to our department, visiting patients, sharing ideas, and filling in full time on units when sisters were away. Patricia was required to develop an educational project for her placement and so for SJR she created a wonderful Art Project that provided spiritual support and sowed the seeds of spiritual growth for patients. It was also an activity that engaged patients' imaginations and alleviated boredom.

The Chapel of Our Lady and St. John remains open 24/7. This is especially important to the staff and patients, and for families and friends who visit patients. Every day, visitors from all faiths,

and none, stop by for a time of quiet, solace and prayer. I change the linens, frontals, and flowers according to the liturgical seasons to remind us all that God's time is with us, accompanying and comforting us. In our entrance hall we always keep our battery candle "lit" beneath our beautiful icon. We ask patients to respect each other's space upon entering. And they do. The patients and many of the staff invite new admissions on their unit to see the Chapel, even providing tours. Life at St. John's Rehab has so many God-filled moments. I remain, as always, grateful to be here and to work with the sisters.


SSJD SUNDAYS

Once we begin construction, we will still need to raise the additional \$1.2 million to bring us to the full \$6 million we will need to complete the project. In addition to the exciting events just mentioned, and more to come, we have a great team of sisters and friends who are submitting many grant applications to foundations that support religious causes. If you cannot make a special Christmas donation

to the project, would you be willing to ask for help from your parish – with the possibility of a fundraising event in the parish? And by all means PRAY!

My Oblate Vocation

My early life was nomadic. My father was in the Armed Forces and we moved from base to base, in Canada and overseas before settling in Montreal, the home town of both my parents.

My mother was the youngest child born to parents who emigrated

from Northern Ireland in 1911. My dad was the youngest of four born into the 5th generation of French Canadians. Between the two families, we were sixteen cousins. I am the youngest of three. Our family gatherings were large, loud, mostly fun, though there were occasional disputes over politics as you might expect, mixing feisty Irish and passionate Francophone blood. Despite the frequent moves, Montreal was "home" and the place we always roosted between postings.

Whenever we relocated, the first place my parents sought was the base chapel or the local Anglican congregation: places of welcome and "instant community". While a teenager in Lachine, QC I was invited to Youth Synod, encountering young people excited about their faith. I was impressed they *knew* where things were in the Bible, all the words to the cool, up-tempo songs we sang; and so many of them *knew* Jesus.

When asked what I wanted to do with my life I would say "I want to be a Sunday School teacher – and get paid for it". The ordination of women was "new" then (1970s) and to be truthful, the reaction by some in the church was not all that welcoming. I really didn't want to fight any battles – I just wanted to get on with the work. My undergraduate degree from McGill is in Religious Studies with some courses in education and creative writing. Though not a "theolog", I lived at Diocesan College where most of my roommates were postulants for ordination.

Eventually I was ordained a Deacon at St. George's in Lennoxville, QC in 1982, and a priest at the Cathedral in Quebec City, in 1984. With my husband Paul, whom I met at Huron College, I've

served parishes in the dioceses of Quebec, Western Newfoundland and Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

The roots of my life as an Oblate were first nurtured by my mother, a long-time Associate. With her, I attended retreats and Quiet Days – she said it "was cheaper than a babysitter" to take me along. I don't remember much about those events, except at one, Sister Anitra said of the Christian life, "Perfection is not the point: wholeness is." Somehow, I knew I wanted that.

My mother, my companion in the faith, was diagnosed in 1998 with Alzheimer's. One of her last gifts to me came while sitting in her kitchen. She told me of her diagnosis, speaking quite candidly about how good her life had been, how blessed she was – how she loved us, our spouses, her seven grandchildren and how she regretted she wouldn't see them grow. She spoke about her own unfulfilled dreams and the things she had hoped to accomplish and then she asked me, "Are you sure you're really doing what God has called you to?"

That question led me back to the same sisters who had supported her spiritual growth – the ones who had fostered in her a commitment to prayer, love and service. I applied for "Women at a Crossroads" and joined in the life and worship of the community at the Convent.

During Crossroads, I learned SSJD was exploring the notion of oblates and eventually I entered the Pilot Project, along with six other women. I began discernment on Epiphany, 2001 at Christ Church, Dartmouth, NS in a blizzard with Sr. Thelma-Anne and about sixty well-wishers. I made my Life Promises on September 18, 2006 at the Convent – in a flood of (happy) tears!

I have much to be thankful for. The Sisters have welcomed me, as have the other oblates, and here I have encountered family and a sense of belonging in a profoundly stimulating and life-giving way. A life of prayer and love and service is my oblation – and vocation.

The Companions Program

September 2024 – July 2025

The **residential Companions** program is an immersive opportunity to experience a contemporary monastic community rooted in the Benedictine tradition. It is open to women aged 21 and up regardless of Christian denomination.

Companions live, work, and pray alongside the sisters, learning from them but also sharing each companion's own gifts with the sisters and their ministries. They will:

- Learn to cultivate peaceful and creative ways of living in a diverse intentional community
- Appreciate silence and solitude as well as community and service for a healthy life
- Put down deep roots of spiritual intimacy with God and each other
- Develop a personal path to ongoing spiritual growth
- Discern individual gifts and vocations.

Open to women of all Christian expressions, **Companions Online** is an opportunity to become "monastics in the world," living a Benedictine rhythm of prayer, work, study, and recreation. Online Companions learn to develop practices that support and nurture their spiritual life from the comfort of their homes.

They meet regularly for classes and discussion groups, and commit to times of personal prayer at home. They share in book studies, participate in online worship and screen films relevant to spiritual growth and self-understanding. Online Companions also develop spiritual disciplines that follow the liturgical year.
